Friendly Advice for Friends when a Friend becomes Ill

I cannot count the times. It is often couples who tell me that when one of them fell ill with a chronic illness, some friends stopped calling or coming by. Sure, initially, there is an outpouring of concern and good deeds. But then some friends (even many) begin to fall away. The calls stop. Fewer call and say, "hey, can I come over tomorrow? I'll bring lunch," or, "Let's all go out to dinner next Saturday night." How hurtful is that? People you were sure were your friends, with whom you shared so much through the years, just seem to vanish when you or a spouse becomes ill.

I witnessed this as a young teen when my father (z"l) became ill with Multiple Sclerosis. At some point, some of parents' friends were no longer my parents' friends. So, I learned this lesson many years ago, and I keep learning it.

Yes, when friends become ill with a chronic condition, their health and physical and/or mental abilities are diminished and usually become more diminished as time progresses. But our friends are still there! They need us even more now. Beyond a ride or reaching something down from a high shelf, they need our presence and support. They need exactly what we gave them and they gave us for years—*friendship*. Tennis, golf and late nights or trips to NYC may no longer be possible, but a lunch outing or a movie at home can be just as much fun and even more important. In short, disabilities are not death.

Perhaps we can think of reasons for some friends to drift away: they feel awkward, they don't know what to say or they see their own fragility and mortality, and so fear keeps them away. Is awkwardness and fear worth turning our backs on a friend? Can we not overcome them?

So, here's the friendly advice for us when a friend becomes ill:

- Simply say, "I'm so sorry this has happened to you." Then listen.
- Now your friend can voice his/her concerns. If not, signal you are okay with them opening up, so ask, "what are you thinking? Listen.
- You can then say, "I'm concerned too. That is scary. I would be frightened. I AM frightened for you and for me. This can happen to anyone."
- Then again, listen.
- A little silence is also okay. You are friends after all. You can handle that.
- Then say, "I want to be here for you" and offer something concrete. Don't say, "if there is anything I can do, just call." That is empty. We never get those calls. Don't make those offers.
- Finally, by all means toss all this advice. Do you really need me to tell you how to talk to your own friends? You will know. Have confidence. You are friends!

What is most important is that we remember that. Remember also what Rabbi Hillel teaches: "What is hateful to you, do not do to others" (Talmud, Shabbat 31a).

Down through the centuries, the Jewish people have been known for our rigorous and creative study and creation of primary Jewish texts – Torah, Midrash, Talmud, and Zohar. The traditional place of study is called the Beit Midrash or “house of study”. A Beit Midrash is sacred space usually attached to a synagogue or located inside in a dedicated room where study partners would pore over a text and discuss (and often heatedly argue!) its meaning.

We felt it was time for Beth Am Shalom to have its own Beit Midrash! After weeks of organizing and categorizing our current MP2 room, the transformation is complete. However, the Beit Midrash will function as more than a study hall. It will also serve as a library offering hundreds of volumes in various categories:

When you enter the BML you will notice a small table next to the bookshelves with a white binder. That binder contains all the information you will need to know to utilize the Beit Midrash and Library to its fullest.

We sincerely hope that 2017 will be the year when we begin a deeper commitment to Jewish learning and we hope the BML will be the place where it all begins!

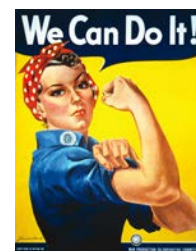

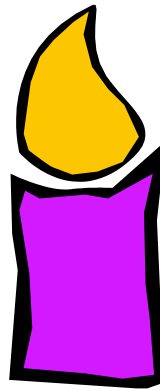

CEMETERY COMMITTEE

Dear Friends,

We at Beth Am Shalom are writing you today in regards to our cemeteries, Beth Olam Memorial Park in Lakewood and Toms River Jewish Cemetery in Toms River. As you are well aware, Beth Olam Memorial Park is in dire need of restoration and beautification. Though much has been done to try and maintain this cemetery, it just hasn't been enough with the limited funds we have.

It has been decided that those of us with loved ones buried there deserve a more serene environment. With this in mind, our cemetery committee has moved forward with a more aggressive plan to rejuvenate the grounds:

1. Grave Stones that have sunk below grade level are being raised to ground level.
2. Starting in late September, a fertilization & seeding program will be started.
3. Irrigation system has been fixed and watering times adjusted to meet needs.

The above courses of action are quite costly and will soon deplete our cemetery fund. In order for us to continue to upkeep our cemeteries and maintain the need of our dearly departed...WE NEED YOUR HELP!!!
