Rabbi's Message

Fearless Journalism—Now More than Ever

Many well known (and some less well known) figures such as George Orwell, William Randolph Hearst and Katharine Graham have been credited with defining news in one of several similar ways. Here are a few:

- "Journalism is printing what someone else does not want printed; everything else is public relations."
- "News is something somebody doesn't want printed; all else is advertising."

According to *Quote Investigator*¹, "The earliest strongly matching expression . . . was published in 1918," but no precise attribution was given:

- "Whatever a patron desires to get published is advertising; whatever he wants to keep out of the paper is news."

Regardless of who expressed it, one of the very best and bravest exemplars of this truth was Ruth Gruber, "a photojournalist and author who documented Stalin's gulags, life in Nazi Germany and the plight of Jewish refugees intercepted by the British on the infamous passage of the Exodus to Palestine in 1947..."¹ She died this past November at age 105 years.

Her *Times* biographer, Robert D. McFadden, also commented, "Ms. Gruber called herself a witness, and in an era of barbarities and war that left countless Jews displaced and stateless, she often crossed the line from journalist to human rights advocate, reporting as well as shaping events that became the headlines and historical footnotes of the 20th century."¹

The issues of reporters' crucial duty to be objective when reporting events versus their moral obligation to intervene to save human lives and preserve justice are critical and hotly debated today. I believe that when covering most events, journalists ought to strive for objectivity, but I allow that there are extraordinary circumstances that cry for the journalist to "cross" that "line" for an even higher purpose.

Some of Ruth Gruber's most important work most definitely falls into that latter category. Without question, Stalin and Hitler did not want the world to know about their atrocities. Ruth Gruber's reporting (and that of others) brought some of the crimes of these powerful and ruthless leaders to light. That is why MacFadden's piece calls her a "Fearless Chronicler."

The best example of what Gruber's "fearless" reporting accomplished came in July 1947 when she was in British controlled Palestine to cover a United Nations conference. When she learned that a ship filled with Holocaust survivors had been intercepted near Haifa's port by the British, she ran there to cover the events. Gruber photographed and reported all of it: the attack to the already damaged and listing ship that killed three and wounded 120, the filthy conditions aboard the *Exodus*, how the British forced the 4,515 refugees onto prison ships and returned them to fenced camps in Germany, "reminiscent of the Nazi concentration camps."¹

According to MacFadden, "The international outcry that followed [Gruber's reporting] profoundly embarrassed the British . . . and helped pave the way for Israeli independence in 1948 and the eventual resettlement of nearly all the interned Jews."¹

Soon after, Gruber wrote a book describing the events in detail; she revised her book in 1999 and 2007 as *Exodus 1947: The Ship That Launched a Nation*. But it was her reporting *during* the events that contributed to Israel's founding as a sovereign nation. No intervening here, Ruth Gruber just told it like it was.

Indeed reporters must do their best to remain objective, so they can report honestly and accurately. The debate between aloof reporters standing above and indifferent to the events they cover or letting the human, ethical component into the equation by taking some action is still important. Nonetheless, when journalists do their best to report the news by confirming the facts, investigating the story to uncover and report the truth, that in itself will advance good causes by exposing what some political, business, organization and other leaders work so desperately to cover up.

I believe Ruth Gruber succeeded in balancing her obligations to her craft and to humanity. In 2001, she said, "I had two tools to fight injustice — words and images, my typewriter and my camera. I just felt that I had to fight evil, and I've felt like that since I was 20 years old. And I've never been an observer. I have to live a story to write it."

I believe we are living in a time when we need—more than ever—a vigorous, unfettered and independent news media that continues to report news with the understanding that there are *facts* and "*alternative facts*" are simply *lies* and will publish both as such despite those who do not want them printed.

If we still desire this kind of news media, we must therefore support it; here are a few ways:

- Buy a newspaper subscription—paper or digital.
- Join your public radio station (beholden only to what 'We the People' need and want to know.)
- Donate to ProPublica¹ or the Committee to Protect Journalists.¹

Need more convincing? President Trump's chief strategist, Steve Bannon, called the media the "opposition party." That is something new in America but not in nations with oppressive governments. The next step for Mr. Bannon may be to label the media "traitors;" arrests and censorship should follow.

Americans will not agree with one another on many of our Government's policies and actions, but for the sake of our rights, the collective good and wellbeing of our democracy, we should all demand to learn the truth about what our representatives and leaders are doing in our name. We must have fearless journalism.

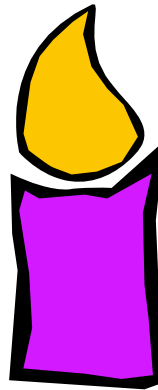

CEMETERY COMMITTEE

Dear Friends,

We at Beth Am Shalom are writing you today in regards to our cemeteries, Beth Olam Memorial Park in Lakewood and Toms River Jewish Cemetery in Toms River. As you are well aware, Beth Olam Memorial Park is in dire need of restoration and beautification. Though much has been done to try and maintain this cemetery, it just hasn't been enough with the limited funds we have.

It has been decided that those of us with loved ones buried there deserve a more serene environment. With this in mind, our cemetery committee has moved forward with a more aggressive plan to rejuvenate the grounds:

1. Grave Stones that have sunk below grade level are being raised to ground level.
2. Starting in late September, a fertilization & seeding program will be started.
3. Irrigation system has been fixed and watering times adjusted to meet needs.

The above courses of action are quite costly and will soon deplete our cemetery fund. In order for us to continue to upkeep our cemeteries and maintain the need of our dearly departed...WE NEED YOUR HELP!!!

Funds are sorely lacking and the cemetery Committee is asking for your help in accomplishing our goals. We are asking for donations to be made to the cemetery fund, in multiples of \$18, chai! These donations can be made on a monthly basis or in one larger amount to be specified to the cemetery fund.
